Soap Carved Sculptures Now Being Displayed at Grade Schools

A collection of sculptures carved from white soap by students of various ages in grades 4 thru 12 from all parts of the United States are being displayed this month in the Farmington elementary schools.

The 25 pieces of sculpture have already been shown at four of the schools and will be shown at the remainder of the local elementary schools the rest of this month.

The collection is one of the famous Traveling Exhibits of Soap Sculptures made available by the National Soap Sculpture Committee in an effort to serve the best interest of sound art education by encouraging this creative hobby.

"Carving in soap offers a medium for self expression at a small cost and with so many easy tools that everyone, no matter how limited their budget, can afford to try their hand at it," art consultant R. E. Benjamin stated.

The 25 sculptures on display were among those submitted in recent Soap Sculpture Competitions sponsored by the National Soap Sculpture Committee.

The contest is entered annually by thousands of young people who compete for prizes donated by Procter & Gamble of Cincinnati and Mrs. Rickard. Several of the students in three classes: Group A—Students in 10th, 11th, and 12th Grades; Group B—Students in 7th, 8th, and 9th Grades; Group C—Students in 4th, 5th and 6th Grades.

First, second and third prizes, as well as honorable mentions, were made in each group, prizes range from \$200 to \$10.

Entry blanks for the 32nd Annual Contest, and other information about soap sculpture, is obtainable at the offices of the National Soap Sculpture Committee, 36-40 37th Street, Long Island City 1, N. Y.

These annual competitions, however, are entered by only a small number of the hundreds of thousands who follow this hobby, with widely differing degrees of proficiency and talent, but with equal enjoyment and devotion.

The major purpose of these competitions, and animal work of the Committee, is the objective of uncovering talented young artists, and providing them with the encouragement necessary to the further development of their future artistic careers.

The collection on display is one of many such Traveling Exhibits now being routed throughout the United States by the National Soap Sculpture Committee to serve as example and inspiration to all who are interested in trying their skill at this simple art.
