The Clarenceville High School Pep Club had its second official meeting October 7.

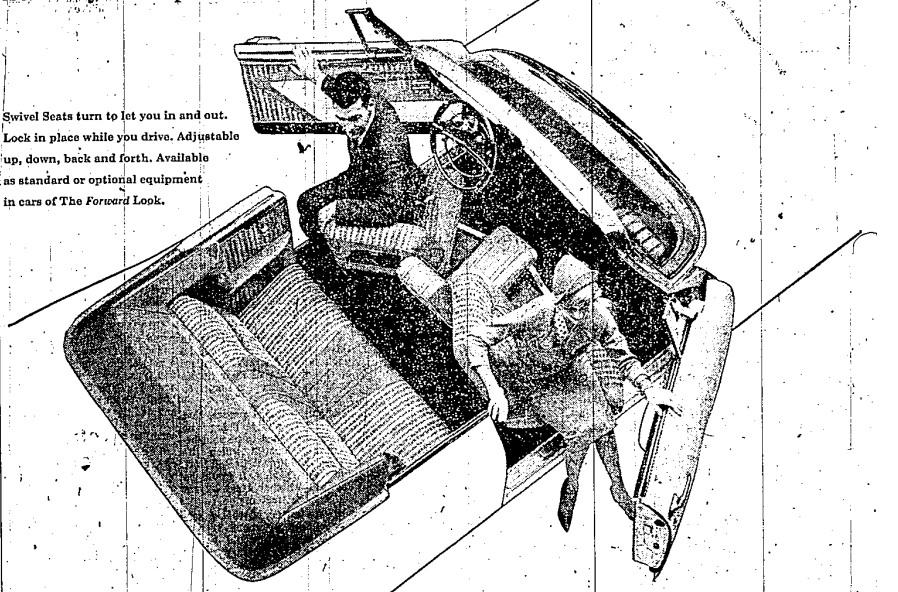
It was decided there would be a floor show at the Homecoming Dance, so decorations would have to be made for the stage. The goal posts and gym will also be decorated.
