Goodwill Bag Distribution at Churches Set
 Peoples of all religions have been asked to cooperate with Goodwill Industries in a community-wide distribution of Goodwill bags during the week-end of January 3-5.

Letters had been mailed to religious leaders throughout the metropolitan area with a self-addressed return card asking for the number of bags that can be used by each religious group. It is to be a bag distribution only, with collections handed in the same manner that goodwill employs throughout the year. A Goodwill truck will collect the filled bag at the request of each individual contributor.

Goodwill Industries is a community project employing handicapped people from all walks of life, and by reaching out to churches they are able to self-supporting people.

In an effort to keep the Goodwill program operating without further cutbacks through the slow winter months, Goodwill has turned to the people who are the backbone of this grass-roots program.

Clothing, shoes and all other repairable household articles are needed to keep the handicapped workers employed.
