

DeMille to Make Movie on Boy Scouts; Founder of Movement

The Boy Scouts and the life of Lord Baden-Powell, founder of the Scouting Movement, will be the subject of Cecil B. DeMille's next motion picture, it was announced by the veteran filmmaker maker recently. The project, to be called "On My Honor," will be a joint venture by DeMille, Farmington Pictures Corporation and Motion Picture Associates, and is scheduled for early 1960 production.

The announcement followed meetings in London of representatives of the Boy Scouts of America, Henry Wilcoxon, DeMille's associate, Olive, Lady Baden-Powell, and Chief Scout of the British Commonwealth, which was climaxed by a meeting in Hollywood over the weekend between DeMille and Dr. Arthur A. Schuck, Chief Scout Executive of the Boy Scouts of America.

At the meetings in London, Lady Baden-Powell expressed great pleasure in the outcome.

"Since the death of my husband in 1914," she said, "I have been dreaming that a film of his life would be made. Now that dream has come true, and I am profoundly thankful."

DeMille will be responsible for telling the story of Lord Baden-Powell. He has given full approval to the project and assured Mr. DeMille of his wholehearted cooperation.

The film, Scouting and its founder has also long been a dream of DeMille.

"For more than 20 years," he stated, "I have been considering the life of Lord Baden-Powell, soldier-hero of the British Empire, has done more for the good of the youth of our time, than perhaps any other man of this era. The Scouting Movement he originated in England in 1907 with 20 boys, has now spread throughout the free world."

"This motion picture will perform an outstanding service in the Scouting Movement. Through DeMille's great skill as a storyteller, his epic qualities will bring the real meaning of Scouting to the people throughout the world in a most forceful and dynamic manner," said the chief Scout executive of the Boy Scouts of America.

From the point of view of those of us dedicated to teaching boys honor, good citizenship, and world-responsibility, it will have the priceless benefit of developing new levels of interest in the Movement. It will recruit more volunteer leaders and greater public support will result to further our work of citizenship development and character building in many years."

This is the same wholeheartedly enthusiastic opinion expressed by Lord Rowallan, Chief Scout of the British Commonwealth, in his talks last week with Henry Wilcoxon, in which he commented especially on the fact that the life of Lord Baden-Powell will be an integral part of the DeMille film, saying "the creativeness of the man and his story are in safe hands. We have offered our full cooperation and support and the DeMille organization is anxious to receive it."

The motion picture, "On My Honor," will be a multi-million dollar screen work, in keeping with the Central Office of the Boy Scouts of America, in the release of the film in 1960, as is planned by Mr. DeMille coincides with America's Scouting's Golden Jubilee to be celebrated throughout the year. Scouting's official birthday in America is February 8, 1910.

Like It or Not, Shots Needed For 6 Diseases

If you fear hypodermic needles, here's some unhappy news from The University of Michigan Medical Center. Dr. Ernest H. Watson, professor of pediatrics and communicable disease, says every one should have basic immunization against at least six major diseases, some of which require more than one "shot."

Dr. Watson declares certain immunizations have become a routine for everyone. Among them are: diphtheria, tetanus, whooping cough, smallpox, polio, and, according to many physicians, influenza.

"Additional immunizations, Dr. Watson says, "depend on your age, where you reside, where you travel, and, to some extent, on what diseases you have already had."

For example, he says, a trip to South America, or Africa would call for shots against yellow fever, typhus, and perhaps cholera. Rocky Mountain spotted fever immunization would be necessary for a hunting trip or camping trip to the Montana-Wyoming mountains.

Many new viruses have been discovered in recent years. Dr. Watson says, and new vaccines will be made from them to add to the basic six. He mentions the common cold and other forms of influenza as among those diseases for which vaccines are sought.
