Run On
Community - Preservation Platform

Raymond B. Wilcox and Arthur S. Bassette, township trustee candidates in the Feb. 16 primary election, will run on a Community-Preservation Platform, which was announced today by Norman Liebert, Chairman of the Farmington Township Association for Community Preservation.

"The Association's only political interest is in the problem of preserving Farmington Township for rural-suburban living," Liebert said. "Running on the association platform, Ray Wilcox and Art Bassette will give strong voice in the Township Board to all homeowners who want to make sure our town ship does not deteriorate into a city area."

Running under the FTAC banner, "KEEP OUR COMMUNITY RURAL," Wilcox and Bassette will stand on a platform whose principal planks include:

- 1-Putting to a vote of the people any proposal for increase in municipal services and consequent taxes.
- 2-Maintaining existing zoning regulations and providing strong enforcement of these regulations.
- 3-Raising of zoning standards wherever practicable.
- 4-Regulating necessary commercial building in order that such building will not interfere with the area's desirability as a fine residential community.

Saturday night saw the Falcons in winning form again as they out-played and out-scored Northville in the first two quarters, taking a commanding half-time lead of 29-11. The third period pace was quickened and Northville slowly inched toward the lead.

A 50-50 tie at the end of the game was the best Northville could produce, outscoring the Falcons 27-11 in the fourth period. Six points in the overtime period was enough for Farmington, holding Northville to one lone point and winning the game, 56-51. The J. V.s now
