Volunteers Praised for Putting Torch Drive Over Top in Bad Yr.

A final audit has revealed that a total of \$15,885 was given to the volunteers in the Oakland Township region for the Tenth Annual Torch Drive last fall. Mrs. Victor H. Marsh of Royal Oak, Oakland County chairman, disclosed last week. This amount was \$1,412 more than the quota assigned to this region. It hoped Oakland County to contribute \$158,833, or 29.28% over its quota toward the 1959 budgets of 185 health and

community services. Altogether, \$1,202,826 was raised in neighborhood canvassing throughout the Torch Drive solicitation area. Other types of fund-raising brought the grand total to \$16,300,000, or 5860,000 more than the goal set last September. Mrs. E. J. Buehler of Davidsburg, Oakland, Township regional chairman, attributed success of the drive to the untiring efforts of devoted volunteers and the widespread realization that the needs of the beneficiaries served were greater than ever. "This year was to have been a rough year in that it raised money," Mrs. Bundy pointed out. "The Torch drive was generally considered to be a national recession. It did not look like an easy job to raise the \$44,783 assigned to our quota. Medical Mirror WHAT DOCTORS SAY ABOUT... Q. "Could you discuss sleeping sickness? Will it look for answer in Medical Mirror?"—Mrs. M. A. Sleeping sickness, (epidemic encephalitis) as it occurs in North America, is caused by a brain-damaging virus of which there are at least three varieties—"St. Louis" (because it was first recognized there), "Eastern" and "Western." There is evidence to indicate that the virus is spread by wild birds. Mosquitoes pass the virus from bird to bird and probably from bird to man and certain large animals. Persons stricken with sleeping sickness have fever, severe headache and a general feeling of sickness. They may be very nauseated and out of their heads. The delicious taste lasts a few days in most cases but in some it may drag on, for weeks. Science has not yet found a sure cure for sleeping sickness. Mosquito control seems to be the only way to prevent or check outbreaks of the disease.

Q. "If the wife needs a blood transfusion is it wise to use the husband as the donor?" A. This is a matter for the physician to decide. There is probably no blanket rule to follow. Generally, a husband-to-wife transfusion would be considered provided they are of the same blood type. This does not mean that the husband's blood matches the wife's blood exactly. More than 30 different blood factors have been identified. Blood is usually classified according to "type." Special tests are performed to find out whether the husband's red blood cells match to the wife's.
