FIRE RULES ESTABLISHED

Department Announces Alarm Signals to Locate Fires.

Send all fire alarms to telephone central.

All firemen report at water works building instead of going direct to fire.

Fires may be located by the following alarms:

One long and one short ring of the fire bell indicates fire in the territory west of Division street.

One long and two short—all territory between Division street and school street north of Grand River.

One long and three short—all territory south of Grand River between Division street and School street.

One long and four short—all territory east of school street.

The firemen have their meeting the first Wednesday night of each month and everybody is invited to attend.

Wants to Renew Contract

By renewing its contract the Detroit House of Correction will again take Oakland county prisoners who receive 65 days or more. Last September the old contract was cancelled by that institution and at the October meeting of the board of supervisors it was decided that it would be necessary to build an addition to the jail to care for prisoners, but the question of bonding the county to build the addition was put up to the voters at the last election and was lost by a narrow margin. Under the new contract prisoners will be boarded for \$1.75 per week, regardless of the length of their sentences, but no prisoner can be sent for less than 65 days. It is expected that the renewal of this contract will obviate for the time being the crowded conditions at the jail and dispel the present necessity for additional jail quarters.

Death of Ghas. Fendt

Ghas. Fendt passed away at his home in this village last Friday at the age of 69 years. He had been in poor health for several years, but was only confined to his bed two weeks. He is survived by his wife, three daughters, Mrs. Ida Langston of Lansing, Mrs. F. S. Neal of Northville and Mrs. Glenn Green of this place, and one son, Louis Fendt, who lives on the old homestead southwest of town.

The funeral was held from the German Evangelical church Monday, Rev. A. C. Stange officiating. Rev. and Mrs. A. Martin of Detroit sang at the services. Interment was made in Oakwood cemetery.

Fear Always Helps in the Spread of Epidemics—Source of Disease Invariably From Within.

ENDED LIFE CALMLY.

Prof. Louis Charles Robin, the enthusiast for the co-education of the sexes, who committed suicide in Paris, recently, killed himself with extraordinary calmness and deliberation. He was seventy-five years of age, and when he underwent a serious operation five years ago he had had bad health. He held the opinion that any man who became incapable of useful work should "disappear," and to carry out his belief he obtained poison. After taking a small quantity he sat down and made notes of his condition. One entry, made at 11 o'clock, was to the effect that his effort was "unsuccessful," and that he must "take a larger dose, which he expected would be fatal. Professor Robin was usually an early riser, but as he had not appeared by ten o'clock in the morning his son went to his bedroom and found him almost at the point of death. He pointed to a bottle and was just able to say that he had taken some of the poison. He died soon afterward.
