

Antioch Luth. to Take Part in Suburban Evangelism Mission

Beginning at its morning worship service this Sunday, Antioch Evangelical Lutheran Church, the United Lutheran congregation in the Farmington area, will participate with Lutheran congregations of Redford, Mt. Clemens, Southfield, Plymouth, Roseville, Walled Lake, and Birmingham in the Suburban Evangelism Mission.

During the week following this Sunday, all these congregations will hold special services every evening, each with its own outstanding guest preacher. The purpose of the Mission is to help both members and non-members of the Church of God, through Jesus Christ, and how He calls people to serve Him in His Church. During the week preceding the Mission, members of each of these congregations have been calling on both fellow members as well as neighbors who are present in any denomination of the church, to invite them to attend these special services.

Services at Antioch will begin at 8 p.m. in the O. E. Dunckel Jr. High School on Twelve Mile Road, between Orchard Lake Road and Farmington Road.

Guest preacher at all these services will be the Rev. Herman Stuemphle, Jr., of Gettysburg, Pennsylvania.
