Medical Mirror

WHAT DOCTORS SAY ABOUT

Q. If x-rays are harmful, why are people who are perfectly well treated to have chest x-rays taken? A. Because benefits of properly conducted chest x-ray program far outweigh possible harm.

The conclusion of a special investigative committee appointed by the Ontario (Canada) Tuberculosis Association and the American Lung Association is that x-rays support this view.

Q. What is the best way to use soap? A. Soap and water is excellent provided a mild hand soap is used. Strong soaps might affect the trim used on some faces.

Several good cleaning fluids are available through optical stores. These contain a mild alcohol solution which takes off most spots. Sinec-treated glasses are satisfactory for use except on lenses that have no anti-reflective coating.

Q. I have heard that doctors are called "mirrors" in England. A. Yes. In England a good many surgeons lack the title of Doctor and even physicians may not
