

Visiting Nurses Services Locally In 1958 Increased Substantially

Visiting Nurse Service in Farmington in 1958 shows a remarkable increase over 1957 according to figures just released by Mrs. Gertrude Redmond, VNA supervisor for southern Oakland County.

In 1958, a total of 327 patients were cared for in their homes and 1,462 calls were made by visiting nurses. In 1957, only 223 calls were made on 71 patients. Farmington showed the greatest increase of any community receiving Visiting Nurse Service in the southern Oakland district, Mrs. Redmond stated.

Rehabilitation of the aged and aid and instruction to new mothers continue high on the list of services made available in Farmington. "Anyone in need of home nursing care may call the VNA office at Royal Oak, L.I. 2-1200, for information."

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
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
