Plan New Courses, Some Fall Curriculum Changes

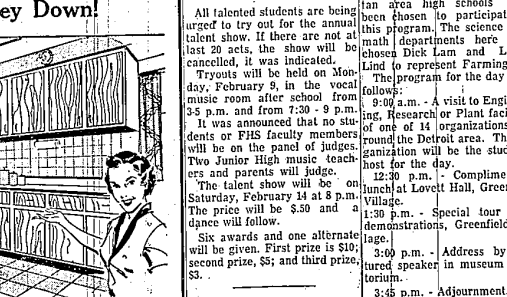
A few more changes have been made in next year's high school curriculum for F. H. S. Building Construction will be a course for seniors who have had Mechanical Drawing I, cabinet making and pattern making. The course will be a study of next year's curriculum of building practices and materials. There will be shop work in construction. These will not be offered, however, unless sufficient numbers enroll.

Physical Science will be a course offered to seniors only. There is no prerequisite. This course deals with the topics of physics, chemistry and astronomy. The course is designed for those high school students who have not taken or do not plan to take chemistry or physics. Fundamental principles of these two sciences are considered without knowledge of advanced mathematics.

Machine Drawing will be an elective course for eleventh and twelfth graders who have had Mechanical Drawing I, Applied Drawing and Plane Geometry with at least a 'C' average in drawing. Advanced machine drawing will include work on machine parts, gears, cams, assembly, and detail. The course
