Medical Mirror WHAT DOCTORS SAY ABOUT: Turpentine & Topples Mother's Leg Cramps

Q. As kids, we were given a few drops of turpentine on sugar for coughs. What do you think of this? A. Years ago this may have been okay but we have better things today. This raises another point. Don't keep turpentine or any would-be harmful material within reach of children. Toddlers are likely to try anything as the following true story from the New York Poison Center shows. Three children were playing in the basement and found a can of turpentine. They put some in glasses. The two older children only pretended to drink it, but the 3-year-old swallowed some. Fortunately, a quick trip to the hospital for emergency treatment prevented permanent injury. The only safe rule is to keep beyond reach anything that youngsters might conceivably eat, nibble, chew or swallow.

Q. I have had three children and during each pregnancy I had severe leg cramps. What causes these pains and how can they be prevented? A. Leg cramp during pregnancy is very often attributed to a mineral imbalance—too little calcium and too much phosphorus. However, Philadelphia doctors recently cast doubt on this theory. Some expectant mothers only pretended to drink it, but the 3-year-old swallowed some. Fortunately, a quick trip to the hospital for emergency treatment prevented permanent injury. The only safe rule is to keep beyond reach anything that youngsters might conceivably eat, nibble, chew or swallow.
