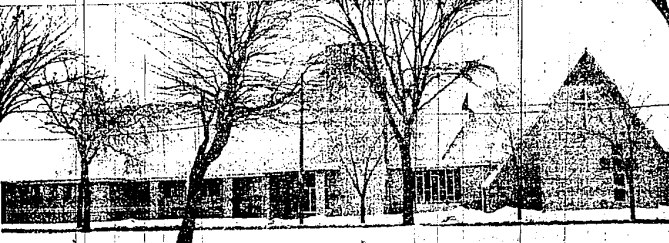

Grace Lutheran to Dedicate New Sanctuary This Sunday

This Sunday, March 1, the congregation of Grace Lutheran Church, 2550 Grand River Ave., will dedicate its new sanctuary with four separate services. Two services of worship will be held in the morning at 9:00 a.m. and 11:00 a.m. in the afternoon at 2:00 p.m., and one in the evening at 7:30 p.m. The pastors of the parish, the Rev. Victor F. Halboth, will officiate. In 1953 the congregation found it necessary to extend its facilities. Enlargement of the sanctuary, the social rooms and Sunday School classrooms was completed at a cost of \$100,000. Soon it became evident that the building could no longer house the congregation. In 1954 the entire Sunday School was moved to a public building and in 1955 a committee was formed to raise money and under the direction of Rev. Erwin Kurth, with Al Braun as chairman and William Morrison, C. Rock, Ray Meade and Walter Schumm as co-chairmen began to function. Ground was broken for the new church June 2, 1957. The approximate overall cost of the new building is \$600,000, including furnishings.

S'field Church Camp Rally Set for Friday

The Southfield Community Church, 2122 Indian Street (near Eight Mile and Inkster), will hold a camp rally Friday, February 27, at 7:45 p.m. which parents and other adults are especially invited. Eighty-eight young people from the church attended the camp, Camp Michawana, last summer. Pastor Raymond S. Bayne is director of the camp which draws campers from over 100 churches and 15 different denominations during the summer season. A color film of the 1958 camps will be shown and new application folders for 1959 will be distributed. Camp songs which parents will be part of the program. Located thirty miles from Kalamazoo in the state-owned Yankée Springs Recreation Area, Michawana is in its twenty-second season with 7 weeks of camping for boys and girls 9-18. The first three weeks beginning July 19 are for girls, followed by teen-age mixed week, August 8-15, followed by three weeks for boys closing September 3. The program includes instruction and activity in all sports. This includes a Red Cross waterfront program which requires every camper to pass at least one Red Cross swimming test. The direction of Rev. Orvin Van Loan, Jr., of the Berkeley Community Church, handles craft, hiking, and daily Bible study classes and evening devotional services. Many former campers are now active in various forms of Christian service as a result of their experiences at Michawana. Camp applications need to be made early since most weeks are filled in April and many have to be turned away.

The building is of contemporary design, the walls inside and out are made of face brick and the roof is supported by massive trusses on which are laid the steel joists of the ceiling. The spacious chancel is finished in light oak paneling. On either side of the chancel, the ceiling side windows through the side lighting being installed. Space is provided in the chancel for the choir. Temporarily the electronic organ from the old sanctuary will be used in the new building. The focal point of attention in the sanctuary is a most unusual altar. The old sanctuary was built on an open area below the level of the center area. The center area has a Detroit, Friday, Feb. 20. 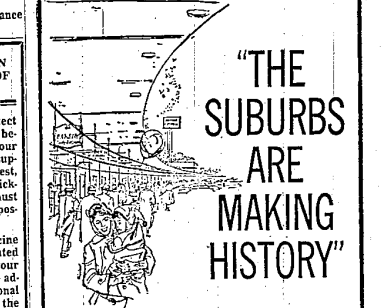
