**Plan Program For Maximum Park Enjoyment**

Representatives of the Conservation Department, National Park Service, and Michigan State University are formulating an interpretive program designed to create maximum enjoyment of Michigan and its state parks and recreation areas.

Adapted from the national park system, the proposed program's master plan establishes state-wide objectives that would guide individual treatment of each park. This basic goal is to enjoy the public of the educational recreational and other related values of individual parks.

The tools used to promote this interpretive theme would vary, depending upon each park's particular history, natural features, recreational attractions and other similar traits.

In general, visitor reception facilities would furnish signs, maps and literature depicting each park's features.

Another method would include interpretive centers, museums or similar landmarks to orient the visitor. Other instruments would include outdoor centers, tours, trails and roadside exhibits, lectures and supplementary publications.

Some parks would utilize all of the preceding methods while others would use one or two.

Basically, the information data to assist each park's origin, geology, flora, fauna, history and documentation and bibliography. Additional information would include local factors influencing park development, patterns of public use, concessions and inventory of facilities.

Initially, four parks have been chosen as experimental sites to give direction in further developing the over-all state plan. The pilot projects are Fort Wilkins, Wilderness and Bay City state parks and Proulx Lake recreation area.
