Many taxpayers are coming in Tuesday to the interpreter sewer and special assessment districts. Many people in the "Non-per" areas of the township are having plenty of trouble with septic tanks. 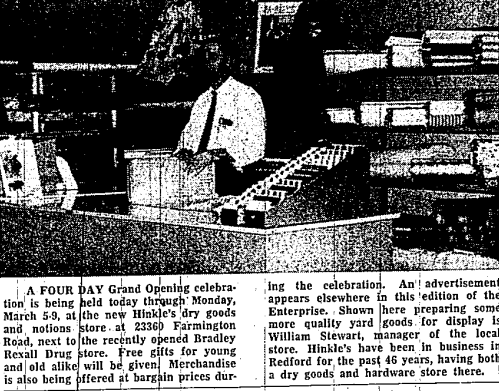

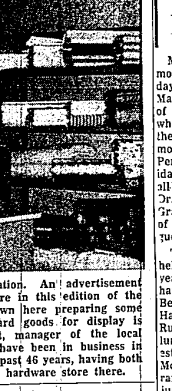
