Polio Shots A Must!

It is criminal, and parents should be prosecuted or at least persecuted if they haven't seen that their children have three polio shots. We've urged this before, and expect it will need to be said again and again.

Even the polio epidemic in Detroit last fall doesn't seem to have scared enough people.

The 57 per cent of Michigan's preschool children who still aren't immunized need to start the three-shot series immediately. If shots aren't given now, children won't be protected when Michigan's evalled naralytic season starts

contaren won't be protected when Michigan's so-called paralytic season starts next June or July.

Only 29 per cent of children under one year of age are vaccinated, and the record is poor up to five years. Best protected are children from five to 14: There is a big drop in vaccinations in the unper is a big drop in vaccinations in the upper teens, but the worst is in the 20-39 age group, with 60 per cent not vaccinated. The recession has kept many from getting their shots, it's feared.

Manufacturers, including Parke-Davis in Detroit have had to destroy tons of vaccine, outdated because of the demand lag.

If we continue to procratstinate, In we continue to procratstinate, next summer could be very unhappy. Because of the outbreak in this area last year. Michigan recorded 550 cases of paralytic polio — almost five times as many as the 121 cases reported in 1937.
