Peckham, Fawcett Take 4ths in State Mat Meet

Farmington finished in a tie for eleventh place in a field of 16 teams at the state high school wrestling finals held in East Lansing Friday and Saturday.

Farmington's Tom Peckham and George Fawcett captured fourth place medals to lead Farmington to its fifth finish.

Fawcett who lost but one match all season led off with a win over Mark Davis of Kalamazoo in the initial bout. He defeated Davis with a pin with 42 seconds gone in the second period. In his next bout Big George dropped a close 5-4 decision to Mickey DeVoe of Lansing. Fawcett advanced to the final and was allowed to compete for a third-place finish in the match. The Falcon heavyweight won by defeating Al Freudenberg of Dowagiac by a wide 13-2 margin. In the consolation rounds Fawcett lost to Larry Jim. Duss of Bay City Handy in the consolation final. The only pin in the bout was a one point escape by Duss but it was enough for the Bay City wrestler to win resulting in a fourth place finish for Fawcett.

In the 112 pound class Tom Peckham defeated Gary Clark of Lansing Eastern and Jim Sawyer of Battle Creek before dropping a decision to Ypsilanti's Roy Wilbanks.

In the fight for third place Peckham lost to Larvell Buchanan of Flint Northern by a 4-2 margin.

Two other Falcon wrestlers in the tournament didn't fare quite so well. Jerry Cassell, competing in the 126 pound class, dropped an 11-3 decision to Jim Gray of Willow Run. The loss was Cassell's first of the season. Dan Ressler, 165 pounder, also lost his first bout of the year when Wade Lightheart of Battle Creek eked out a 4-3 decision over the Falcon grapple.

Earlier Ressler had extended his season long winning streak by defeating Al Freudenberg of Dowagiac by a wide 13-2 margin. In the consolation rounds Ressler lost to Bill Robinson of Ypsilanti.

Lansing Sexton won the state team championship with a total of 74 points. Jackson was the second place finisher. The Falcons 15 points left them in seventh place tie with Flint Northern.
