Mrs. Joseph Laub will show slides of her trip around the world.

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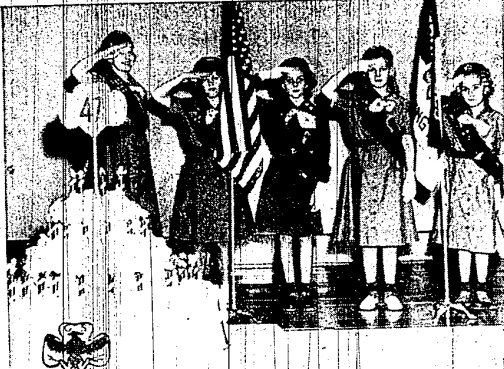

AAUW Open to All Holding Degrees from Approved Colleges

An invitation to all qualified women to join the American Association of University Women has been issued by Mrs. David Mills, membership chairman of the Farmington branch of the AAUW.

The AAUW accepts as members all women holders of approved degrees from a list of over 300 colleges and universities. Mrs. Mills explains, "To be on this list, a college must have a high academic rating, provide a basic foundation of general education, make an adequate provision for women students, give significant recognition to women on its faculty and administration and maintain academic freedom in its administrative and teaching bodies."

Throughout its 77 years as an organization, the AAUW has worked for higher standards in education and particularly for better education for women and greater recognition of women as teachers and administrators. All colleges seeking to be added to the AAUW list of approved institutions must have good housing for women students, treat women students on an equal basis with men, have on its faculty a reasonable number of women, and have a salary and promotion arrangement as are granted to David Mills.
