**Clerks Ready Vote Instruction**

Instruction ballots are ready in both the city and township offices, and the clerks are ready to explain the April 6 voting instructions to voters.

Both Twp. Clerk Floyd A. Cairns and City Clerk (Tren) Quinn have had a number of inquiries thus far. There are quite a few names and, proposition with which voters are not familiar, a little study before hand will pay off in time spent in the voting booth.

Clerk Quinn reports she registered 27 voters the last day, and that there are now 3,000 registered voters in the city. Two years ago there were 3,249 registered in the city.

**Permit Needed To Burn Trash**

Permit must be obtained in the City of Farmington for trash as well as grass fires. Joseph DeVriendt, director of the Department of Public Safety, reminded this week.

The permits are issued at the Department of Public Safety office.

He also reminded that the following procedures should be taken before starting a fire:

1. Clean a space far enough from any buildings.
2. Burn in a proper receptacle.
3. For larger fires, have the necessary tools including rake, broom, shovel and water (in either buckets or by means of a hose connection) in the event of the fire getting out of control.
4. Be sure that the fire is not started close enough to neighboring property to do damage.
5. Be sure that the fire is not started near trees, grass or buildings, since you are responsible for any such damage.

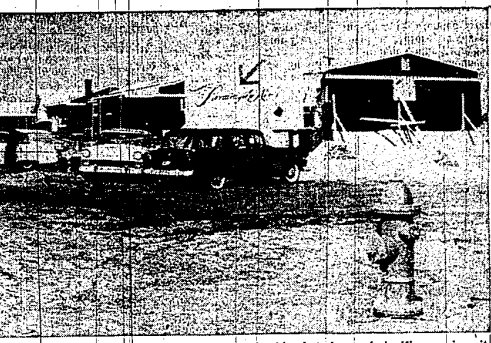
The family lives in Livonia, and the couple has four children.

**Several Previously Denied Vets Will Get Renewal on Claims**

**WASHINGTON** — More than 280,000 veterans whose claims for compensation or pension had previously been denied by the Veterans Administration will now have their claims reviewed according to Sumner G. Whittier, Administrator of Veterans Affairs.

These veterans are those whose claims were disallowed by VA after World War II and prior to 1945 for the reason that their claimed disabilities were not shown by the time of their last examination.

The VA for the past several years has been conducting a review for errors in compensation and pension claims, although after World War II and veteran organizations have been conducting a similar review of disallowed cases.

**STUDY MADE**

Consequently, a pilot study was ordered in March, 1958, by Mr. Whittier to determine whether a broadened review of disallowed claims was in order. The pilot study was carried on in seven regional offices in widely-separated sections of the nation.

By far the largest source of the comparatively few errors discovered was the category "disability not shown at time of last examination." A full review is being ordered of the more than 280,000 disallowed claims in this category.

"Although I was most gratified to learn from the pilot study that the overwhelming majority of cases had been properly adjudicated," Mr. Whittier said, "I feel that a broadened review is in order as a matter of equity and complete fairness to the veterans involved."

**REVIEW FINDINGS**

Projecting the finds of the pilot study to the disallowed claims involved in the broader review indicates as many as 2,000 veteran-claimants might be found eligible for monetary awards.

The new review, Mr. Whittier said, will soon be underway in several VA regional offices on a "time available" basis, and will be extended to all 67 regional offices as soon as the current workload permits.

The Tesla Coil, named after the man who invented it, is a means of generating enough power to activate fluorescent and neon lights without stringing wires or plugging into electrical outlets. The coil generates 70,000 volts at a very high frequency. At this frequency the actual current is harmless to human beings, because it travels over, rather than through.
