ANTIQUITY OF PORTO RICO

n First Occupied by Man It May Have Been Connected With Bouth America.

Ethnologists have reason for thinking that Portq Rico and the adjoining islands may have been peopled from the valley of the Orinco instead of from Yucatan. Few traces of these aborigines are now to be found except in the interior of the island. The sum is stupendous, when compared with that in any European country, but not abnormal in our own. The largest contribution comes from J. Pierpont Morgan instead of from Carnegie or Rockefeller, as formany pears past, and is made up almost wholly of art treasures presented to the Metropolitan museum. This probably means that when the Carnegie Corporation and the Rockefeller Foundation have been completely endowed we shall have no more such huge donadions from once such huge donadions from single individuals. The determination of the people to prevent any further accumulations of such wealth through monopoly and privilege virtually assures the end of that regime.
