Going to Youth Meet in Indiana

Todd Misko of 28875 Orchard Lake Road, Farmington, is among 174 young people from Michigan registered for the 25th annual Youth Conference to be held on the campus of Indiana University, (Upland, Indiana), April 10, 11 and 12. A capacity enrollment of 1,000 visiting people from throughout the U.S. will be attending the three day religious convention. Speakers for the mass services will be Jack Wyzanski of New York and Dr. Douglas Wright from Wheaton, Illinois. Wyzanski is the founder and director of the Word of Life Camps and coasts to coast youth program. Wologmuth is Overseer, Director of Youth for Christ International. Several discussion group sessions will be held. The young people will divide into small groups to discuss problems which they face in daily living. The conference, one of the largest of its kind in the Midwest, is expected to draw visitors from at least 15 states.


