Leukemia, A Form of Cancer, Hits All Ages Leukemia, a fatal cancer of blood-forming tissues, is often thought of as a child's disease. This is because children are quick to respond to tragedy involving children. Leukemia causes about 2,000 such tragedies each year. But the leukemia problem is far greater than this. Last year the disease killed over 9,000 adults. Furthermore, leukemia is now being found in children, the American Cancer Society reports. The greatest increase is in men and women over 60. The leukemia death rate for men in their early 60's has nearly tripled since 1930. And for men over 65, it has increased fivefold. In a quarter of a century, the leukemia death rate for these men rose from 8.4 to 41.5 per 100,000 population. Although it occurs less frequently in women, leukemia has risen spectacularly in the older brackets. In 1957, the leukemia death rate has more than doubled, and for women in their seventies increased from 12.2 to 22 per 100,000 population. Faced with these facts, the American Cancer Society has stepped up its research attack on leukemia. It reports that current research by the Society for leukemia research in total more than \$1,500,000 per year. This includes grants for virus research, for the study of leukemia, the ultimate solution of the problem, since there is some evidence that leukemia may be transmitted. Ten years ago leukemia was considered a hopeless problem. But today there is hope. Through the discovery of possible cures, it is now possible to prolong lives months and even year in some leukemia patients. However, to have an effective cure against one kind of virus-caused mouse leukemia.
