Late Teacher Honored At Arbor Day Program

Students at the Middlebelt elementary school chose Mrs. Anna Abbott as the theme of their April assembly program and fittingly took this occasion to honor Mrs. Ula Abbott, deceased. Mrs. Abbott who had taught at the Middlebelt school from 1931 until she passed away suddenly last fall took the leadership in Farmington in continuously promoting Arbor Day. Her upper elementary classes always observed Arbor Day as a part of their program, and she was instrumental in promoting other teachers to do likewise. STRONG in teaching the development of an appreciation for natural resources through usage and replacement. Arbor Day was often used by Mrs. Abbott as the highlight of her class conservation projects for the year. The day's assembly program was planned to further promote the idea of Arbor Day and educate the children in its purpose as well as to pay tribute to Mrs. Abbott, a leading educator who had served also as president of the Farmington Education Association and held many other offices and responsibilities throughout her many years of service. FOLLOWING the general program, the children and visiting members went outdoors where Mr. H. M. Roberts' last class, planted an Almey Crab tree in her memory. The tree was dedicated by Miss Minnie Zinke, elementary education administrator, and longtime friend of Mrs. Abbott. "It is the intent of Middlebelt school to keep alive the high ideals and concepts of education as upheld by Ula Abbott," school principal Kenneth Lachmann said. "Although she will be highly respected for her many contributions to education, she will always be remembered for her development of conservation concepts from the practical aspects of meeting the needs of mankind and the love of beauty and the conservation of an appreciation for the aesthetic values important to living graciously." ARBOR DAY was first celebrated in Nebraska on April 10, 1872. Founded by J. Sterling Morton, a newspaper publisher in Nebraska City, the idea came about because trees had been destroyed in the clearing of land, constructing homes, and used as firewood. In the west one could go for miles without seeing a tree. The idea caught on with Birney Northrup of Connecticut that he traveled all over the United States as well as Asia and Europe urging people to plant trees. In the United States today every state celebrates Arbor Day which is set aside for the

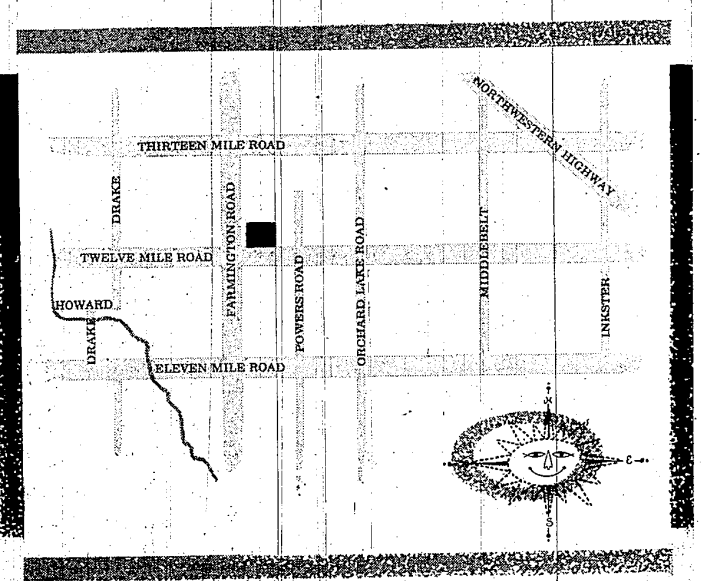
