## Rummage Sale Slated Saturday

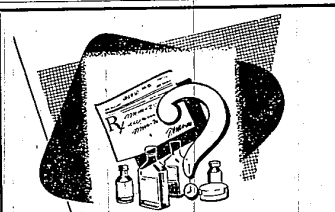
