Cloverdale 4th Graders Visit Meat Market

Fourth grade pupils in Mrs. Ralston's class at the Cloverdale elementary school visited Conroy's Food Market recently to view and gain firsthand information concerning U. S. Government Choice Beef which had been raised on the school grounds.

This was in conclusion to a unit of study on "The Feeding and Raising of Beef Cattle."

Pupils observed Angus and Hereford steers in the stock pens and selected one, weighing about 140 lbs., which they wished to see cut up. It was placed on the chopping block where the butcher carefully and expertly, with sharp knives and saws, carved out roasts, steaks and chops.

They also saw and removed the kidney which was bedded in the suet. The meat was then placed in the display counters.

In classroom studies earlier in the class had learned that all beef is nourishing but that the lower and less tender grades are used for canned or frozen meat and sausage. They also had learned that bones, sinews and suet are ground up and put into animal, poultry and human food as well as being used in the making of soap, glue and bone meal.

The fact that beef is now being used in the manufacture of car tires, such as in the case of a medical research was another real interesting fact which the students learned during the study unit.

Roberta Spaller Only Woman In Classes With 500 Sailors

How would you like to be the only woman in a class of 500 sailors?

That is the situation in which WAVE seaman Roberta J. Spaller, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Spaller of 21716 Albion Street, Farmington, finds herself recently.

Roberta's comment: "You get used to all these men after a while."

Roberta is typical of the few women selected each year to attend the Electronics Technician school at the Great Lakes Naval Training Center. She is one of about a dozen WAVES to graduate from the Navy service school as compared to some 1400 sailors. The school, one of the Navy's most technical schools, teaches electronics, general receivers and transmitters, radar, and specific Navy communications equipment.

"They say the 28-week course is equal to advanced technical education in civilian life," Roberta said. "I feel fortunate in being accepted for the school. It isn't easy but it is well worth working for."

"I like competing with men because if they get higher grades it's not too bad. No like being beaten out by another woman," the 20 year old WAVE said.

A graduate of Farmington High, Roberta was elected to the National Honor Society for her outstanding abilities. She was also a member of the school debate team.

Roberta, whose hobby is singing and who studied at the Detroit Conservatory of Music, was the only WAVE to appear on the Ed Sullivan All-Star television show last year. Recently she accompanied the Naval Training Center band on a two week recruiting tour in Minnesota.

Following her graduation from the Navy school, Roberta will be assigned to the Naval Air Station at Corpus Christi, Texas.

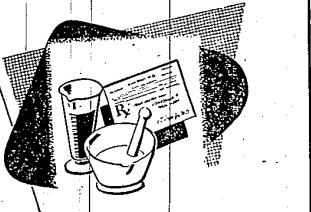
Palette-Brush Annual Meet Set
