

Introduces Bill to Change Law Hampering Community Colleges

Setting up community colleges on the basis of need would be allowed under a new bill introduced by Rep. Harvey J. Beadle (D-Wayne 21st).

"Present laws require that community college districts in one of four classes," Rep. Beadle said. "Therefore, in a populous county no more than one community college can be created."

The present law unduly hampers badly needed expansion of higher educational facilities in Michigan.

"My bill would eliminate this obstacle by allowing a school district to create a community college district either entirely within its boundaries or in combination with one or more other school districts within contiguous counties."

"It would no longer be necessary to include an entire county in a community college district and two school districts in separate counties could combine if they need for a junior college the need."

County, for example, it is not feasible to establish a single community college district to serve more than 100,000 people.

"Community colleges are important to the continued development of higher educational facilities in Michigan, county and state and predicted growth in college enrollments."

At the convention, Miss Audrey Wilder, Dean of Women at Albion College, was elected president of the Michigan Division for the next two years.

Workshop sessions were held within the various fields of AAUW interest, namely: elementary-secondary education, higher education, social and economic issues, legislation, fellowship, international relations, the arts and status of women.

Vets, Families In State Get Large Sum

Veterans and their families in Michigan receive a total of \$178,374.119 in cash benefits and services during fiscal year 1958, the Veterans Administration has announced.

In Michigan, compensation for service-connected disabilities and pension for total and partial disabilities were paid to 114,034 living veterans and 11,404 deceased veterans. Death compensation and pension for 26,477 deceased veterans in the amount of \$22,119,203.

Certain GI insurance and indemnity payments totaling \$12,892,235 were made to veterans and their beneficiaries.

An average of 457 disabled veterans of World War II and the Korean Conflict in Michigan were trained during the year under the vocational rehabilitation act to overcome the handicaps of their disabilities. They received \$1,072,139 in subsistence, tuition, supplies and equipment.

An average of 17,703 veterans trained during the year under the World War II and Korean GI Bills. They received \$23,519,410 in cash allowances.

The remainder of cash benefits and allowances in Michigan during the year totaled \$31,035,068.

These cash benefits and services included war orphans' educational allowances, hospital care, medical services for the disabled, administrative costs and miscellaneous items.

County Fails To Respond to Building Upturn

Oakland County failed to respond to a general increase in residential building activities in the remainder of the Detroit region during the first quarter of this year, the Detroit Metropolitan Area Regional Planning Commission reports.

While communities in Wayne and Macomb counties were issuing 1,800 more dwelling permits than during the first quarter of last year, Oakland county, townships and villages were issuing fewer permits. During the three month period this year, 137 fewer permits were issued in Oakland County than during the same period in 1958.

Heaviest home building activity in the county was recorded in Madison Heights where 119 permits were issued during the first three months of the year. Farmington Township ranked eighth among the 53 communities listed in the Detroit Metropolitan Area Regional Planning Commission, having issued 46 permits for new homes.

Other Oakland County communities issuing more permits than 46 were: Bloomfield Township, 107; Pontiac, 90; Southfield 77; Royal Oak, 68; Waterford Township, 53; Troy, 53.

"Pockets" of uninvacinated potential polio-victims are scattered throughout Michigan, according to the state health department.
