"Visit to A Small Planet" Third Play for Theater in the Barn

Two years ago the Farmington Players inaugurated a tradition: Theater in the Barn. "The Day Is Green" was their first effort, followed by "Present Laughter," "The Sound of Music" and "A Visit to A Small Planet," the first part of next month. This tradition continues.

"We have a popular play, a good cast, and an ambitious production," said George Mullin, ticket chairman for the spring offering. "There is no reason why this performance shouldn't be extremely successful."

Taking advantage of these past experiences and of those being gained by the Farmington Players have turned the barn's limitations into an intimate atmosphere unique in community theater. Some of the audience will be seated beneath an apple tree; others next to the young lovers; some in front of the landing space while everywhere, flowers are in bloom.

The recent efforts staff under Bill Wilson have devised sound effects, created a floating vase and even a flying rifle to make Kram's invasion from continuing more believable as he visits a small planet, Earth.

Mr. Gore Vidal has written this amusing farce which the players will present to the community on May 1, 2, 8 and 9. The production represents the correlated efforts of a community organization interested in all phases of non-professional theater.

"Everyone isn't an actor," said Mrs. George Nielson, one of the founders of the group, "but they certainly are on a stage."

Most of the evening's entertainment is a growing amateur theatrical group, not with the active membership but in the entertainment they receive from their community without which no organization such as the Farmington Players could hope to exist.

It is this type of encouragement that has carried the Players from a church basement to their own property in five years.
