Annual Mission Conference Is In Progress

The Eleventh Annual World Vision Conference of the Southfield Community Church, 21222 Indian Street (near Eight Mile and Inkster), is now in progress. The pastor, Ray Moody Bayne, presides.

The programs feature news reports from speakers recently returned from many foreign fields, color films and slides of many countries, and special music. Included are reports from Congo, and Ethiopia and Europe.

Tonight Thursday, May 7th, Joe Coughlin, Secretary of the National Council of Christian Service, will speak at 7:30. Open to the public, high school young people are especially invited.

On Friday Dr. and Mrs. Dwight Slater of the Belgian Congo will speak at 7:30. Medical missionaries, who have had a special picture program for boys and girls. Adults are also invited.

The closing sessions of the conference will be on Sunday, May 10th, with Rev. Philip Armstrong of the Far Eastern Gospel Crusade speaking at the 7:30 service at 8:30 a.m. and 11:15 a.m. and at the Bible School at 10:00 a.m. He has just returned from the Far East.

The conference is being held in the home of a Confucianist father and Buddhist mother and later becoming a Christian and a member of the Bank of America.

His native country as a missionary, will have a special message for young people.

The first conference session will be on Sunday night at 7:00 with Dr. C. Stacey Woods of Inter-Varsity Christian Fellowship bringing the message. A special feature of the service will be the Mothers' Chorus as part of the observance of Mother's Day.

A missionary committee has prepared special decorations for the church sanctuary for the week including curios and souvenirs from many parts of the world. The theme of the conference is "Who Follows in His Train?"
