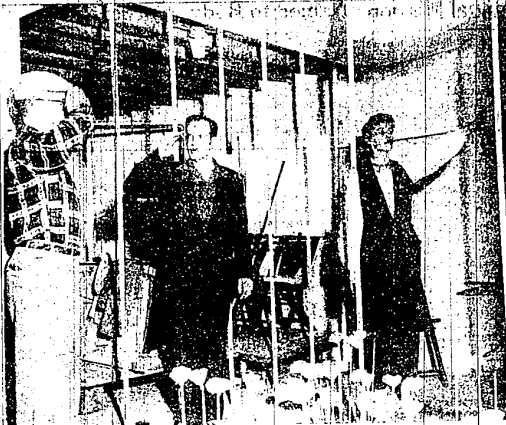


Record Number Named to Honor Roll at Dunckel Jr. High

Space Man's 1st Visits Success; Plans 2 More

At 8:45 the evening of May 1, Farmington Townsfolk welcomed the first "Visit To A Small Planet" visitor from outer space, Mr. Kretz, whose address is the unpolluted million backside to the Milky Way, situated through the Spelling forest and down the garden path into two hours of whimsy and fun in the Farmington Players' production, "Visit To A Small Planet."

Opening to a very satisfactory audience, this was the Players' 14th major production in five years.

Individually, the characterizations are such that the plot appears alarmingly plausible. In the late Spring of 1959, a spaceship appears in Virginia. It was the right place, but, wrong year. He was looking for the Civil War and General Robert E. Lee. The first indication, a Pentagon politician whose interpretation of Jeffersonian democracy was to be his buddy and "sling mud in hissey" to this point the Farmington Players take command of the play. Oiling the boisterous waters is an opinionated newsman (the milkman) who, Farmington's versatile Hope Nahstoll, marks the piggy-wiggly under armed guard. In between, there's Rosemary who playfully puts when she's supposed to be aflame with revolution and a private eye whose specialty is wayward spacians.

AS A FIRST time director, Jim Allison sought to give Farmington, as he phrases it, "an experience in theater." On the whole, his expectations were realized. The cast is refreshingly different. The cast (Palmer Bissell, Hilmer Howard, Hope Nahstoll, Joan McCallum, Jim Stob-

Timely Tips on GARDENING

SPRING GROWTH — Spring has flung a veil of tenderness across the tree tops. The landscape is dominated by the sharp, yellow-green of willow foliage. In gardens, magnolias have opened wide their huge pink saucers of bloom.

LANDSCAPING — The planting in the front, or public area, of the house should be simple and dignified. Evergreens are the mainstay of most foundation plantings, and now is the ideal time to plant both broad-leaved evergreens and the "needle" evergreens.

Careful consideration of the mature size of the plants should be given when landscaping the front of a house. Low spreading types should be used beneath picture windows, with taller-growing forms accenting corners and entrances. Providing variations in foliage color and texture adds interest, but avoid too much variation or the effect will be "busy" or spotty.

NEEDLE EVERGREENS — Yews (taxus) are considered the choicest evergreens. Their needles have a good texture and remain a deep, rich green throughout the year. The female plants bear attractive, fleshy red fruit in fall. Spreading, pyramidal and globe forms are available.

Junipers are also excellent landscape evergreens. They have a lighter green color, or blue-green color that contrasts nicely with the deeper green of other foliage. They are available in upright conical forms, as broad, large spreaders, and in prostrate, creeping forms.

BROAD LEAF EVERGREENS — The inclusion of broad leaved evergreens in the landscape plan adds interesting variety and textural contrast. Rhododendrons have large leathery leaves, and bear large clusters of showy pink, white, or lavender flowers. Other fine textured foliage provides a more pleasing appearance. Mountain Laurel, evergreen azaleas, andromeda, and small-leaved holly are all good choices. Mahonia, or Oregon grape holly, has holly-like pointed leaves, and yellow Spring flowers that are followed by clusters of blue berries.

REMINERS — Thin barked trees such as dogwood, birch, beech, mountain ash, and laburnum must be transplanted

In the Spring . . . Prune rhododendrons . . . Don't let grass get too tall before giving it a cutting. Mow new lawns as soon as any of the blades become taller than two inches. This will help thicken, and toughen the grass.
