# National High Hurdle Record Officially Equaled by Cawley

Farmington's ace trackman Warren (Tex) Cawley, holder of state records in both the 110 and 220 yard hurdles, finally got a share of a national record that counted last Saturday in the state regional track meet at Thurston High in Redford.

Cawley broke over the 120 yard high hurdles course in 13.9 seconds, tied the national record set by George Hern of Admore, Pennsylvania in 1957.

THE PERFORMANCE capped a season of disappointing results for Cawley who has better national records in both the high and low hurdles only to have them nullified by the wind gusting in his favor.

Cawley also added the 880 yard relay team in winning that event.

Although Cawley was stellar throughout the meet, Farmington was able to place only second in 18.6 seconds, a fifth of a second off the national mark. In preliminaries the time was counted as a result of high wind.

A third first was added by Cawley in the broad jump which he won in 40 feet 10 inches.

## Boat Register Rolls in County In '58 Hit 17,600

Of the 217,553 Michigan watercraft registered by the Department of State last year, 17,600 of them were from Oakland County.

According to James M. Hare, Secretary of State, 4,831 boats licensed for use on Michigan inland waterways were owned by out-of-state owners.

"Each year one sees increasing numbers of boat trailers on the highway," Hare said, "watercraft owned by enthusiasts from states not blessed with thousands of lakes and hundreds of miles of river recreational areas." Hare said.

"With the coming of more leisure time and the establishment of additional launching sites and marinas throughout the state, we can be sure that our boat building and watercraft serving recreation industry will continue to grow."

Watercraft registration forms can be obtained at all departments of State branch offices and at most sporting goods shops, sheriff's offices, marinas, and many hardware stores. The fee is \$2.00.
