## 2nd Student Council Vote Necessary

Unethical conduct in the recent Student Council elections forced school officials to call a second vote Thursday, May 21. Several reasons for the election failure were given by Tarmo Maattala, whose government classes were in charge. He said, first, that the voting committee consisted of six compared with 12 or 14 in previous years.

Second, student traffic near the voting machines made voting confusing. Third, a few students became too familiar with the machines and took unfair advantage of the small committee in charge. Fourth, because of increased enrollment this year, four lunch hours have been necessary, which in turn made additional periods of congestion at the polls.

Maattala also suggested two possible ways of avoiding the same problem in the future. They were to move the voting machines out of the hall, and use of a plan which includes four checks. The checks would be: 1. List, punching student I-D cards, checking to make certain the I-D card was punched, and charging one person with responsibility for each voting machine.
