### Local Authority Gives Views on Family Living

A plea to think of family living as an art, with a proper place for skills and techniques, as well as individual talents, was made to the parents of the Mayfair Cooperative Nursery School by a speech by Dr. Richard Kerechhoff, sociologist of the North Palmer School.

Dr. Kerechhoff, a resident of Holly Hill farms, spoke on "Survival Tactics for Family Living" at the final meeting of the school year last week.

Among the many ways Dr. Kerechhoff described that this world was an emphasis on developing "creative relationships with less thought than is commonly given to conforming to the patterns of neighbors, grade parents, or the frequently misleading commercial portrayals.

Dr. Kerechhoff further recommended that in today's fast-paced society families need to find ways to handle tensions, and should not overlook the possibility of healthy appealing to the acceptable mechanisms.

Referring to our generation as possibly one of "neglected parents" in contrast to the older philosophy of the age of the neglected child, Dr. Kerechhoff endorsed the "person-centered home," a home with its marriage in it as well as children, and a home where respect and consideration is given for each individual's needs.

Good communication between members of the family, between the different generations living together under one roof, was essential, although Dr. Kerechhoff expected this could not be guaranteed to guarantee peace and tranquility. Certainly some protection against fatigue should be found for the mother and housewife, whose job he described as straining beads on a string that has no knot in it.

While adding his approval to the current emphasis on "togetherness," Dr. Kerechhoff warned that we must not forget the great values of "aloneness" which does one find a alone time for philosophical contemplation in our life?" he asked.

One of the vital jobs of parenthood which the speaker emphasized is that of helping children lose their dependence on the parents, certainly a difficult role to play. "Parenthood is a business trying to put itself out of business," he said, "and this is the way to do it."

Calling for a changing and growing love of one's spouse, while differentiating that love from the careful, romantic love known before the arrival of the family, Dr. Kerechhoff asked that parents show that adulthood is worth growing into by the way they are adults. He stated that the best help to be given children to grow into self-reliant men and women was their own parents' models of mature adulthood.

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
