Call Planning Meet for City Park Project

A special meeting of the City Council, planning commission and officers of the Farmington Junior Chamber of Commerce will be held June 29 to discuss ways of assuring success of the proposed Jaycee park in south Farmington.

FIRST AND foremost the recently elected Jaycee president, Al A. Garfield, did not want to embark on the project unless they had definite assurance the park would always remain a park.

THE LAWS seem to indicate a park can't be sold by a city except where it is not required under an official map plan. This is a tough matter, and officials are searching for a way to permit such a change in park use.

A contract on joint maintenance of the city radio system was approved by the city council Monday, after offering to the township board.

THE JAYCEES have filed application, and ask for a five per cent increase in wages granted the contract will call for \$4,200 this coming year.

Two zoning changes were completed Monday by the city council after earlier consideration and approval.

THE CITY council agreed Monday night to study suggestions on how the city could be kept cleaner.

THE COUNCIL accepted the business men's offer to donate \$150 for trash cans for the downtown area, and the library board.

IT asked the city manager to study ordinance to put teeth into throwing litter on streets, and also on handbill distribution.

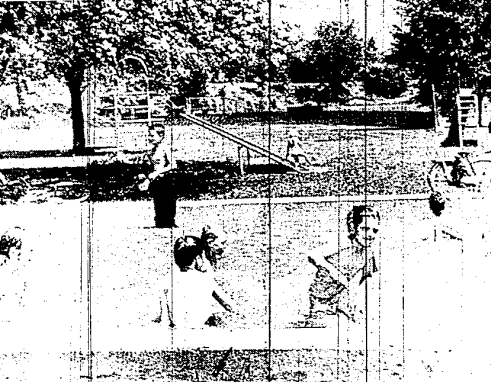
OFFICIALS pointed out that Grand River is a main thoroughfare and that state law provides \$100 fine for throwing things from cars onto the road.

THE CITY'S taxicab ordinance has been studied as a result of complaints other cabs were coming into the area to solicit fares.

IT definitely provides that any cab which picks up or offers to pick up fares in the city limits must be licensed by the city. Cabs can deliver fares from outside anywhere within the city, of course.

POLICE will be instructed to check better to see that taxicab cabs are not operating illegally in the city.

INSURANCE carried under the ordinance may have to be changed. The ordinance now requires at least \$25,000 bodily injury and \$1,000 property damage insurance.

One Mill Vote, Staman Paving OK'd by Twp.

The township board approved a resolution last Thursday night in a closed meeting to place before voters a proposal for a special election to increase the tax limitation to increase the tax limitation by one mill.
