With US Fleet On Great Lakes

Arthur A. Honke, electronics technician second class, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. L. M. Honke, of 20681 Peerington, is participating in Operation Inland Seas, a cruise of 28 United States Navy warships to cities in the Great Lakes this summer.

The Navy fleet, which includes destroyers, a heavy cruiser and an amphibious force of seven ships, will visit 27 cities in the seven states bordering the Great Lakes. The ships will enter the Great Lakes on June 25, and return to the Atlantic Fleet in late July.

This is the first time a man Great Lakes since the War of 1812. The entry of the ocean-going fleet is made possible by the opening of the recently completed St. Lawrence Seaway.

The ships will visit the following cities and states: Illinois—Chicago; Indiana—Michigan City; Michigan—Bay City, Detroit, Marquette, Muskegon, Port Huron, Mackinaw City, Sault Ste. Marie; Cheboygan; Buffalo; Oswego; Rochester, Dunkirk; Ohio—Cleveland, Toledo, Lorain, Ashland; Penna.—Erie; Wisconsin—Milwaukee; Minnesota—Minneapolis, Sheboygan, Green Bay, Ashland.

Commended for Fixing Organ

Dennis Unks, son of Mr. and Mrs. A.R. Unks of 24619 Orchard Lake Road now stationed at the Fairchild Air Force Base, Spokane, Washington, was commended recently for his somewhat unusual hobby of repairing an old organ.

The following is an account from a Spokane newspaper of his work:

"The behind the scenes hands of a Fairchild Air Force Base airman made possible the restoring of a 25 year silence at the Fox Theater this week.

For the first time in a quarter of a century, the theater's big pipe organ filled the house, Airman 2/c Dennis Unks didn't play the organ himself; Mrs. Neva Nixon, prominent Spokane organist did for Gonzaga university commencement exercises.

But Dennis made it possible through five months of his own freely-given time and talent. Patiently, that long ago, Dennis began to repair the big organ as a hobby. Nights, after being on duty all day at the base, he took parts of it home and cleaned them.

He relettered at least 400 organ valves more than half the organ's total.

Before he began his task the organ wasn't even speaking so many valves were deficient. Bit by bit, Dennis cleaned and restored the instrument."

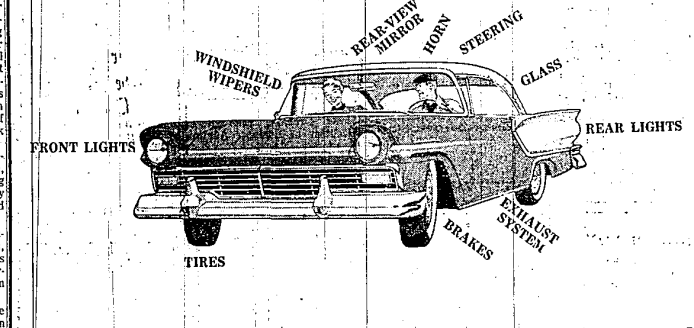
