## Players Close Season With June 20 Play

The June 20 meeting of Farmington Players will close the current season and give the membership; and their guests an opportunity to meet the new board members and officers elected last month.

For the coming year their activities will be directed by Jim Allison, president; Bob Higgins, vice president; George Naisht, treasurer; Bessie Han-son, secretary; and Mildred Sullivan, Ron Jackson, Fred Hamilton and Phil Kidd as board members at large.

Feature of the evening will be the first production of Bob Higgins' award winning play, "The Great Carlton." Based on personal observation, the play is set back stage of an off-Broadway carry-type revue.

Directed by Higgins and assisted by Mrs. Hannan, the story revolves about the professional integrity of a once great magician whose hands reflect his years instead of his spirit and the hypocrisy of a belly-dancer plus the eager ambitions of a kid whose sole theatrical experience is: front row center of the Jersey "burly-houses."

There is, also, the simple minded, iron-gutted "Geek" whose contribution to the three day show is masticating nails, chicken heads; and whatever; Danny Boy is the show's Fagin-like producer; summe the forces of Zanina, disdains the Geek, relishes the adulterations of Mochie, the boy, and, though being the end of Carlton the professional, is regarded by Carlton becoming a man.

In the all-Farmington cast, Carlton will be played by Charles Hannan while the femi-nine high schooler, Mochie, will be portrayed by Mary Ann Perry; Burke Martin, who is appearing for the first time in a role; Allison is playing the Geek and the role of Mochie is being handled by Don Gallet, a 17-year-old junior from the Farmington High who, according to an officer of the group, will make Player history with his interpretation of an extremely difficult role.

The 1959-60 season which traditionally opens with the Farmington Players October production, promises to be, according to the group, an excellent season with three major productions and at least six one-acts already scheduled, (titles and dates to be announced later).

## Will-O-Way to Offer Choice of 3 Programs

The University Program offers three six-week courses: June 22 - August 16. Classes will meet Monday through Thursday with a choice of hours: 4 - 5:30 p.m., or 8:30 - 10:00 p.m.
