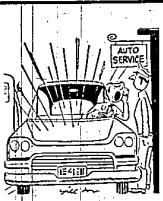

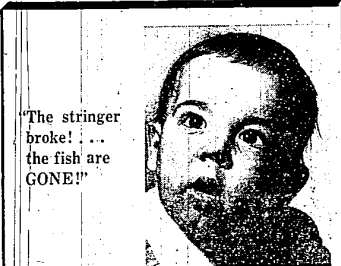

## P. Lachmann Rites Saturday

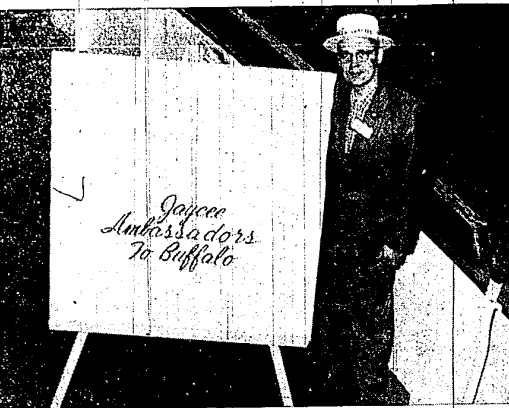
