Cawley Performs Brilliantly In National AAU Track Meet

Her Cawley has distinguished herself as one of the top hurdle men in the nation as the result of his fine showing in the National AAU track meet held in Boulder, Colorado last Friday and Saturday.

Competing with top runners across the nation, Cawley took the 500 meter low hurdle, fifth in the 110 meter high hurdle and sixth in the 400 meter hurdles.

HE WAS THE only schoolboy in the entire country who qualified to compete in the hurdle events in the National AAU meet.

The exhaustive schedule Cawley set for himself, the toughest of any entrant, had track men on their feet for five days and nights. On Friday he had to run two races in both the 110 and 400 meter events. In the longer event he shared the fastest qualifying time of 51.2 seconds. This is the fastest time in this event ever run by a high school boy.

Despite Cawley's tough schedule on Friday, he was back on Saturday to again display splendid speed and form in placing third in the 200 meter low hurdles.

CHARLIE TIDWELL of Kansas University took first in the low hurdle event in a record setting 22.6 seconds, 1/10 of a second faster than his old American mark and 1/10 of a second faster than Harrison Dill, and's AAU record of 23.3 seconds.
