Leave Troubles At Home, Top Driver Urges

One of the nation's outstanding truck drivers, who has driven for 26 years without an accident, offered motorists taking the highway for the holiday weekend six tips on how to stay alive over the Fourth of July.

The trucking industry's driver of the year, Carl C. Crim, 41, of Okmulgee, Okla., suggests the six rules for safe driving:

1-Be in good spirits. Leave your quarrels behind you.
2-Don't drink for more than two hours without a coffee break or a stretch.
3-Stay within all speed limits.
4-Obey all orders of highway patrols.
5-Know your equipment. Check your tires and brakes and be able to judge distances.
6-Be courteous. Give the right of way to others.

Mr. Crim was named Driver of the Year by the American Trucking Associations, Inc., for his combination of safe driving and a record of life saving both on and off the highway. He has driven 1,500,000 miles as a tank truck operator. Several times last year he stopped his truck to rescue accident victims.

Fireworks, Unfurling of Flag To Highlight July 3 Festival

Firing of the largest aerial fireworks display to be seen in the nation this year and unfurling of the world's largest American flag will highlight Hudson's participation in the International Freedom Festival.

Two other features will be a two-day public showing of "The Dynamic St. Lawrence Seaway," a three stage rocket will be thrust into the sky.

In the event of inclement weather, the fireworks display will be held at the same time.

Walker, President of Detroit Edison and chairman of the Freedom Festival's Independence Day Committee, will be the speaker at the flag unfurling ceremony. This will take place shortly before 10 a.m. on July 3.

This will be the last showing of the 48 star version of Hudson's "Patriotic" flag, which weighs seven stories tall and weighs more than three quarters of a ton. A decision from Congress on the 50 star design to include Hawaii was awaited by Hudson's which needed six weeks to alter the huge flag field.

The "spectacular" 23 foot high and 40 feet long, will be fired on separate barges. The first, titled "Salute to the Queen" will have an outline of the North American continent, flanked by symbols of the American eagle and the royal insignia of Queen Elizabeth II. A liner of flame will trace the Seaway route from the Atlantic to Detroit-Windsor.

The second spectacular, called "Independence Day-Then and Now" portrays three figures of the Spirit of '76 breathing a flag from the period of the thirteen colonies. This setting changes to reveal today's 49 stars with a fifth star representing Hawaii—circling about in the background. Planking is a huge spinning globe, from which a three stage rocket will be thrust into the sky.

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
