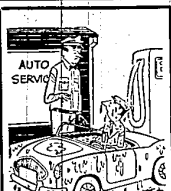

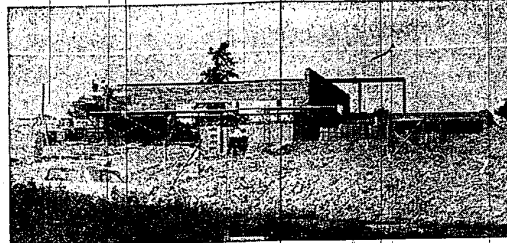

#### Drinking Will Cause Half of Road Deaths

The chances are that one out of every two people who will die on Michigan highways over the Independence Day weekend will be involved in an accident caused by a drinking driver.

According to James M. Hare, Chairman of the Michigan State Safety Commission, studies of traffic fatalities during recent months show that more than 50 per cent of automobile accident deaths were due either to drinking drivers or drinking pedestrians.

"We regard the drinking driver as one of the most troublesome factors in our State Safety Program," Hare pointed out. The worst of it is that many accidents are caused by people who have been drinking at home or celebrating with friends at social gatherings. Growing sales of bottled spirits for home consumption compared with tavern and bar sales makes this an increasingly difficult problem to solve."

The Michigan State Safety Commission hopes that drivers who have been drinking at holiday gatherings will leave the driving to someone who is completely sober.

"The unfortunate fact is that we have pedestrian fatalities caused by people who have had over two drinks too many before they walk home from taverns or parties," Hare said.

"When such a person staggers into a street or on a highway he can involve a normally careful and prudent driver in a horrible accident, with the careless pedestrian as the victim. The driver, no matter how innocent, is left with legal problems and horrible memories. I wish I knew what we could do to solve this problem."

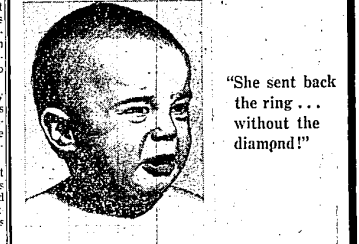
#### Sundrla Promoted At Post in Germany
