Psychologist J. Clayton Lafferty and Delmo Della-Dora, co-sponsors of the program, will discuss the topic at the first meeting to be held July 12 at 10:30 a.m. at the church, located on Warner north of Grand River.
The program will be discussed by speakers and moderated by the discussion following will be the discussion of mental hygiene in the school curriculum.

Missionary to Talk Sunday at First Baptist

Dr. Vincent Brushwyler, general director of the Conservative Baptist Foreign Mission Society, Chicago, will speak at the First Baptist Church on Sunday, July 12, at 11:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m.
Dr. Brushwyler has visited all of the Society's mission fields in Asia, Africa, South America and Europe, surveying the work of the missionaries and conferring with them regarding the future plans for more schools, hospitals, and other expansions. His most recent trip was to Europe, the Middle East and Far East, visiting in Italy, Portugal, Arab areas near West Pakistan, India, Japan, Philippine Islands and Formosa.
Dr. Brushwyler, a missionary minister, was elected to the board of CBMFS when it was organized in December, 1943 and served as chairman of the board of directors in 1944. Mr. Brushwyler was chosen as the first general director of the Society, a post which he has held since that time.
The CBMFS has been one of the fastest growing foreign mission societies in existence. At present it has over 300 missionary ministers, more than 1500 Baptist churches in this country.

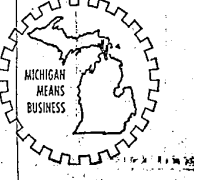
