returned to Des Moines, Iowa, by plane Monday.



Lot More Than Cooling Is Done

The primary reason for most purchases of air conditioning units is that they permit a person or family to avoid heat. Keeping cool in the summer is more of a problem than keeping warm in the winter. Filtering the air is another duty. Irritating pollen and dust are removed by the air conditioners to keep home furnishings clean and maintain a beautiful interior climate.

Whenever a room is stuffy or full of smoke, an air conditioner can bring fresh, filtered air in from outside. Its ventilating capacity is so high that it can completely change the air in the room in just a few minutes. To keep air from becoming stagnant and setting as a suffocating blanket, an air conditioner keeps the air circulating in gentle, constant movement. This function also helps reduce heat and keeps you more comfortable.

Walters adds that many new units, sometimes called "four season" air conditioners, are designed to reverse their usual function, when desired, and act as a source of supplementary heat. When the weather turns quite cool in the morning or evening, as well as in late fall and early Spring, these units help take away the chill.

Swimmer Itch Can Be Avoided

Persons who swim in inland lakes can keep from getting "swimmer's itch" by drying themselves immediately after leaving the water, the Michigan Department of Health said.

The itch is caused by a tiny worm that is able to bore into the skin when the skin is covered by a film of water and when the water is evaporating.

Man usually isn't a part of the worm's life cycle. The usual hosts are small snails and waterfowl that eat the snails. The snails live in shallow water in some lakes.

When the worm enters human skin it sets up an annoying skin irritation that lasts two or three days. A calamine type lotion will reduce the itching, the state health department said, but a better method is to dry immediately after leaving the water, and not allowing the parasite to get into the skin.

Other preventive measures include: killing the snails with rotenone; keeping water flowing away from swimming sites.
