

Wash-and-Wear Has Problems

Wrinkle resistance is a basic property of wash-and-wear fabrics. Home sewers find that wrinkle resistance works to disadvantage at times, says Barbara Spiker of the textiles, clothing and related arts department of Michigan State University.

For example, if a fabric resists wrinkling, it also resists creases or pleats that you try to put in a garment and you may find it difficult to press seams flat and smooth. Other construction problems arise when you try to ease fullness over the top of the sleeve,
