

12 from Area Receive Sister Kenny Treatment

The Sister Kenny Foundation, a Torch Drive service, revealed this week that during the past year it had provided nine Farmington residents with outpatient treatment and three with in-patient care.

In-patients, those who must remain under care day and night for days or weeks, are housed in the new \$3,800,000 Rehabilitation Center at 261 Brady in downtown Detroit. The outpatients, those who are given treatments on certain days, come to the Sister Kenny Foundation Center at 22646 Woodward in Ferndale.

KENNY-TRAINED therapists and nurses provide treatment and therapy prescribed by physicians. The therapy developed by the late Sister Elizabeth Kenny in Australia is used to prevent crippling after-effects among polio sufferers. The effectiveness of this treatment is demonstrated by the many former polio patients who have no

Urge Yearly Pelvic Exam For Women

A yearly pelvic examination is essential to every healthy woman over 35 years of age, says a specialist at The University of Michigan Medical Center. Dr. Samuel J. Behrman of the U-M Department of Obstetrics and Gynecology stressed that a checkup can give a clean bill of health and welcome mental relief to those women worried about the possibility of cancer. It can also be a means for early detection of cancerous growth before it gets out of control.

Many early cases of cancer of the pelvic organs are missed, he said, when women neglect their examination simply because they "had no symptoms." As in other diseases, he explained, many symptoms of cancer may not appear until the illness has reached an advanced stage. An early checkup by a physician could find and permit treatment of the disease while recovery is still possible. Feelings of fear, humiliation, guilt or modesty which often prevent a yearly checkup are unwarranted by the simple half-hour examination, Dr. Behrman declared.

It is a routine checkup which encourages proper medical diagnosis and treatment. Moods of depression in the older woman may label her "neurotic," he said, resulting in inappropriate care. A thorough pelvic examination would permit identification of any disorder and correction by medical or surgical means. Dr. Behrman also pointed out that a modified pelvic checkup of an adolescent girl can assure her that her pelvic development is normal and that she will be able to have children safely.
