If you're vacationing in the vicinity of the Mackinac Bridge on Labor Day this year, you might want to go for a stroll across the length of the huge structure.
The Mackinac Bridge Authority has made joint plans with the International Walkers association to conduct the second annual five-mile trek across "Mighty Mac" on Sept. 7. More than 500 walkers are anticipated.
They'll walk for free from St. Ignace in the Upper Peninsula, to Mackinaw City at the South end. If you make the hike in less than an hour, after the 9 P.M. start, the walking association will award you a special achievement certificate.
Normally the bridge is closed to pedestrians.

Municipal officials from Michigan cities and villages will gather at Mackinac Island on Sept. 10 for the 21st annual convention of the Michigan Municipal League.

Topics also to be discussed on the program include "Ancestry - Before and After," and "Municipal Governments in Michigan's Economic Future."

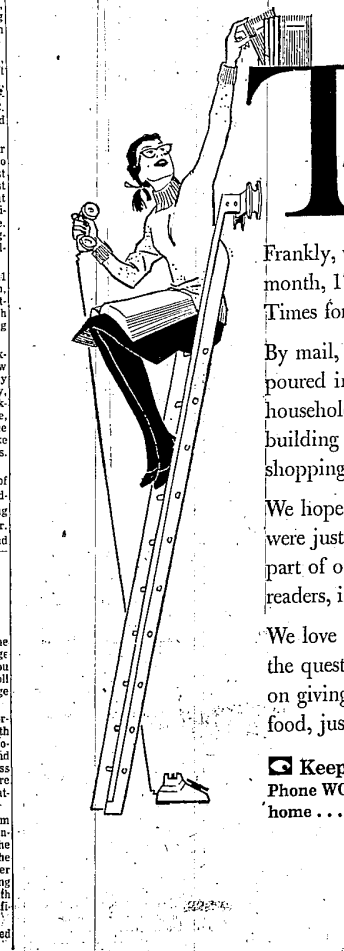
Christian Science
