Mayor Lindbert opened the meeting by reading the petition on the rezoning of 300 feet of Freedom Road (frontage lying west and adjacent to the Cloverdale School from R-3 (Multiple Dwellings) to C-1 (Local Commercial) for discussion.

Mr. Win. Butler, attorney, remarked that many future plans have been decided upon for this non profit organization.

A building not to exceed 30,000 square feet is planned on this 80,000 square foot area.

Wood Creek Farms Village

Students at Clarenceville schools from kindergarten to senior high will see many new faces school behind their desks this fall.

A total of 29 new teachers will have been added to the teaching staff of the Clarenceville school district by the time classes begin Sept. 10. Of the 29 arrivals, 11 will be filling brand new staff positions.

The announcement of Clarenceville's total added faculty members was made Tuesday by Louis E. Schmidt, Superintendent of Schools.

NEW POSITIONS already filled include six in elementary grades, two in junior high, one in senior high and one in special education. Schmidt said that only one normal teaching vacancy remains at this time and that he expects this position to be filled before school opens.

Sixteen of the new staff members are from Detroit area colleges and universities. Four are graduates of schools elsewhere in Michigan and eight are from other states.

At full strength this fall, the Clarenceville teaching staff will number 103. The new teachers, their assignments and the colleges from which they graduated are:

Sub Name Changes Becoming Problem

There was some discussion if it might be necessary to change all the records, but no action was taken.
