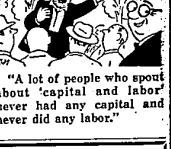

Mrs. Higgins pointed out that each of the plays was read by at least three committee members. Mrs. Perle Briggs serving as committee 1-act specialist stated that the group working with her read thirty-five 1-act plays this year. When a suitable 1-act play is found, it is submitted to the program committee for their private production at one of the Players' monthly meetings. Other members of the play reading committee are Pauline Budgeon, Lee Kidd and Alberta Mullin. In answer to the question, "What standards are used in selecting a play for possible production?"
