Ordinance on Fencing OK'd

A new fencing and excavation ordinance will go into effect Oct. 10 in the township. It was passed by the board Tuesday night, and is published in this issue.

It is designed to stop any developer making excavations for basements or utilities, then leaving them open for long periods. State law sets a 90-day limit. The new township ordinance pretty much follows this, except that only 30 days are allowed. If the basement can't have a foundation put in at that time, the excavation must be fenced to protect children and others.

Bond Interest Refund For Staman People

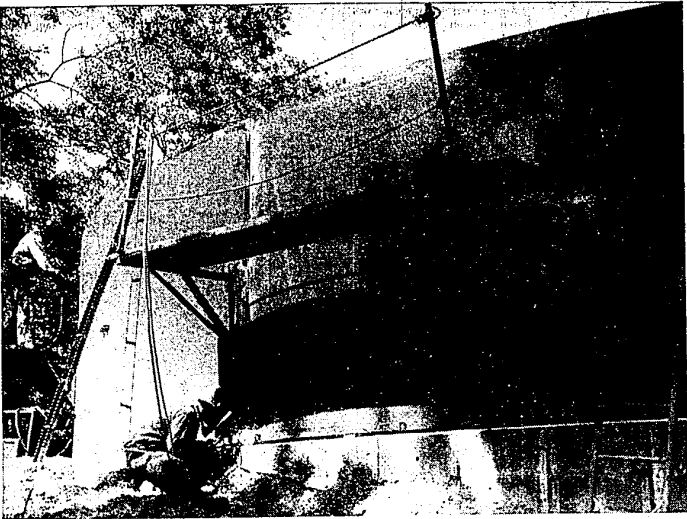
Refunds for interest payments on Staman Acres blacktopping bonds will be made to some residents, the township board decided Tuesday.

Many residents paid their year's bond interest in full. However, while these interest payments started last year, the bonds were sold only this June, so only half a year's interest was needed. With no need for this extra cash, it was decided best to refund it.

Some New Speed Limits Are Possible

Temp. Clerk Floyd A. Cairns reported to the board Tuesday he had asked again for a check by state police and the county on speeds of several main roads in the township.

He feels there is a fair possibility the speeds might be reduced to 50 miles per hour. The roads include 12 Mile, and Farmington and Orchard Lake roads north of the city.



LACK OF WATER, an annual problem during the hot, dry summer months, should be eliminated in the City of Farmington within the next few months. Large tanks are now being set in place and welded together. When completed, the tank will provide storage for an additional one million gallons of water.

Total storage capacity in the city at the present time is only 250,000 gallons. With heavy use during the hot summer months, water could not be pumped from city wells fast enough to keep pressure up. A curtailment of water use was thus necessary. No such restrictions should be required next summer.

The youths have admitted passing checks in Farmington, Livonia, Plymouth, Ann Arbor, Dearborn, Oak Park, Royal Oak, Garden City and Howell.

Using the name of Gerald Malloy, one or the other of the two would cash a check at a store, showing identification as Malloy with a Detroit address. The checks would be made out to Malloy by another party.

Farmington City Police Chief Joe DeVriendt issued another warning to local merchants to use caution when cashing checks for unknown persons.
