'Y' Saturday Recreation Sign-Up Starts

Registrations for the fall term of the Saturday Recreation Program sponsored by the Northwest YWCA at Lady High School are now being accepted at the Branch building, 2350 Grand River Avenue.

The program which is open to all junior and teen-age girls will start Saturday, September 26, and continue for a ten-week term. Instruction in all phases of swimming for beginners, intermediate and advanced is offered during the morning with a special class for adult women and another for mothers and daughters. The tot boys and girls, should be from 2½-5 years of age. Girls 6 years and up will choose their classes according to their swimming ability.

Participants are also entitled to choose other activities besides swimming for the same fee. The program starts at 8:45 a.m. and runs thru 12:30, with classes being offered in crafts, painting, creative dancing, fencing, and games. Boys from 6 years thru 12 may enroll in all year-round activities.

A Chalm School for girls 12 years and up will give pointers on good grooming, fashions, poise, and diet. Mrs. Joyce Krause, instructor, will help these teen-age girls become more attractive and classy.

Toddlers, 2½-5 years, may join the creative dance taught by Miss Marge Van Winkle. The program is the mother's swim class. Some of the other teachers are Mrs. Margaret Whitfield, Crafts; Miss Alice Worski, Painting; and Miss Pat Patton, Fencing and Recreational Games.

Friends and borrowers at the Farmington Public Library over the past year will extend good wishes on work well done by Mrs. M. Leach Sunday afternoon at 2 p.m. in the new library when she will be honored with a set of appreciation and acknowledgment of library services for the past 21 years.

As Chet Downing wrote in his "Story of the Library" which appeared in The Enterprise of February 26, 1959, prior to the open house for the new library, Mrs. Leach was Farmington's first salary librarian which was a requirement of the Michigan State Library when the city and township organized to operate this institution jointly, with state aid.

It is interesting that at this time, the annual budget for its operation totaled only \$500.00, half of which was paid by the municipality; state aid totaled \$500.00.

It took courage and careful nurturing to carry on in these early days, recognizing the community's need for its service but lacking adequate funds for its encouragement to function. It was with real satisfaction that during her active years of library work, Mrs. Leach can take her full portion of credit in the establishment of our present library.

Mrs. R. M. Grinager and her committee, with the assistance of the Friends of the Library, directors Gladys Olds and Barbara Brown, have worked diligently on the preparations of the tea for Mrs. Leach. Refreshments will be served by Mrs. Leach's friends and the general public are cordially invited to attend.

Offer Classes For Expectant Moms and Dads

Expectant Parent Classes are again being offered in Oakland County for future fathers and mothers.

The series of classes are taught by public health nurses and are sponsored by the Oakland County Medical Center, the Oakland County Department of Health and various Adult Education Departments.

These classes have become increasingly popular throughout the County.

In 1954, two series of six classes each were offered. From September, 1959, through May, 1960, twenty-one series, each consisting of a series, are being conducted at the four offices of the Oakland County Department of Health.

Attendance is limited to a maximum of 26 people, to provide ample opportunity for discussion. Classes begin at 7:30 p.m.

Films and other audio-visual aids are used to highlight certain topics; a conducted hospital tour is arranged during each series. Topics covered during the series include the mental health of the family unit; growth and development of the baby prior to and immediately after birth; labor and delivery; and care and feeding of the infant.
