## Student Drivers Affected By New Auto Regulations

New student driving regulations have been instituted at Clarenceville High this year. The new regulations govern the use of motor vehicles by students traveling to and from school, as well as during the school day. No student will be allowed to drive unless he has permission from his parents and from the school.

If a student is granted permission to drive he will not be allowed to use the car while school is in session nor during the lunch hours.

When a new license plate is issued, or a change of car is made, the change must be reported to the high school principal.

Limitations on student driving are these: The student may not drive at any time between the hours of 8:10 a.m. and 2 p.m., except for the purpose of getting to school, returning home or going to work. While the driver is attending school, the auto will be parked in a designated parking area and not in nearby streets. No loitering nor smoking near cars will be permitted.

The regulations will be enforced for the purpose of making more safe the local and state highways for both teen-agers and adults, officials said.

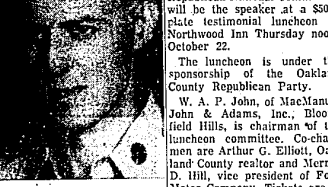
