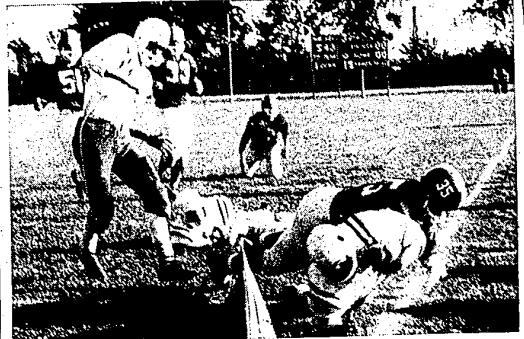
Baseball Auxiliary Moms Meet Monday

Second-Half Surge in Opener Earns Falcons Tenth Straight

With a second-half surge, Farmington High successfully inaugurated its 1959 football season last Friday afternoon here.

The Falcons hosted neighboring Livonia-Bentley and posted a 12-0 victory over the Bulldogs. A scoreless first half was dissolved midway through the third quarter when fullback Ron Hoffmeyer plunged one yard to pay dirt after a sustained drive.

That margin was enough to do the job for the Falcons but Quarterback Harv Chapman added some insurance in the fourth period on a 25-yard touchdown pass to Larry Hawkins.

CHAPMAN missed both extra point tries.

The win was No. 10 in a row for the locals in a season extending back to the 1937 campaign.

"The team showed a lot of promise," said Farmington Coach Jack Hayes, "but it lacks polish. It was something we had expected."

In the third period, the Falcons marched 50 yards to break the scoreless deadlock. Chap-man, halfbacks Ben Rader and Jack Atchison, and fullback Hoffmeyer combined on a series of ground plays. Hoffmeyer crashed over from one yard.

Ypsilanti Lincoln High spoiled Lynn Butler's debut as Clarenceville's head football coach last Friday evening by a 21-7 margin.

The Trojans lost the services of their first-string fullback Joe Nye early in the contest and their offense failed to click.

Ypsilanti's Railspitters, hosting the Clarenceville invaders in the season opener for both squads, shaped a two touchdown half time lead and coasted home.

The big thrill for the Trojan rooters came in the final stanza with CHS trailing 19-0. The Railspitters had penetrated deep into Clarenceville territory when Trojan lineman Julius Kovary picked a Lincoln fumble out of the air and raced 76 yards for the touchdown.

With only seconds remaining, the Trojans scored the extra point and trimmed the deficit to 19-7.

Following its second touchdown, Lincoln scored its final two points on a safety.

The Railspitters completed six of ten passes and amassed more than 200 yards in total offense while the Trojans had only one completion and gained less than 100 yards in all.

Nye was injured in the opening moments of the game. Taken to a hospital for examination, he was treated and released. He will be lost for 10 days and will miss the West Bloomfield game tomorrow.

The Trojans will travel to West Bloomfield for a night game tomorrow evening at 8 p.m. They will seek to even their record at one win and one loss.
